












Heart Of The Race: Black Women's Lives in Britain





Directed by Steve McQueen, this anthology series consists of five films, each telling a unique story about the West Indian community in London from the 1960's to the 1980's.




I May Destroy You – BBC iPlayer

This documentary investigates the scandal of Black children being disproportionately sent to schools for the "educationally subnormal" in the 1960s and 1970s.










Professor Dame Elizabeth Anionwu

Born in Birmingham in 1947, Dame Elizabeth faced numerous challenges, including being placed in care as a child. She overcame these obstacles to become a pioneering nurse and health advocate, particularly known for her work in sickle cell disease and thalassemia.

Constable Andrea Reynold

A founder member of the West Midlands Police Black and Asian Police Association, she has been a significant figure in promoting diversity and inclusion within the police force. She was awarded a King's Police Medal in 2022 for her contributions.















Black Inspirational Brummies

Ignatius Sancho

Although not originally from Birmingham, Ignatius Sancho's legacy as a writer, composer, and abolitionist has had a lasting impact. Born on a slave ship, he later became a prominent figure in the fight against slavery.

Benjamin Zephaniah

A poet, writer, and activist, Benjamin Zephaniah was born and raised in Birmingham. His work often addresses issues of race, politics, and social justice. Zephaniah is also a prominent figure in the Rastafarian community.
